

CCISD board discusses options for campus

The Crystal City Independent School District held their board member meeting on February 14, 2018 at the district's central office. All school board members were present for the decision of the action items on their agenda.

Superintendent Imelda Salinas held a public hearing at the beginning of the session to provide the public with some information on test score results from the prior year. The student's scores presented showed growth in knowledge in the majority of the subject's tested. The district is accredited at this time but it doesn't change the situation with the Tomas Rivera Campus.

The board discussed the possibility of taking action on an option that would decide the fate of the Tomas Rivera Campus. The district has an option to allow an outside entity to take over the campus. The district would have to enter into a contracted agreement which would allow the outside entity to take control of the campus. Board Member Jose Uribes encouraged the board to consider sending a letter of intent to the Texas Education Agency advising them of the district's interest in this option. Board President Eduardo Cuellar stated that the best option was to wait until the Zavala

Elementary campus tests and receives back their results. He explained that handing control over to an outside entity might not be in the best interest of the children and the staff. Ms. Peggy Young made it clear that she was worried about the staff perhaps possibly losing their jobs if TEA would come in and take over, as a result of the Zavala campus not meeting standard.

Mr. Jose Uribe asked what guarantees the staff at the Rivera campus that they would have a job if Zavala failed to meet standards. Mr. Cuellar stated that a board of managers could be appointed to manage the Rivera campus and that he felt that whoever is appointed would not want to remove any staff. Ms. Young added that a board of managers does not guarantee that the staff will still be employed. Mr. Castillo stated that he would have liked more time to discuss the options that are available for the Rivera campus. Ms. Young stated that this issue is very serious and that no one is willing to discuss the options. Board Member Nora Guerrero stated that this issue has been a serious issue for several years now. Mr. Cuellar added that the board of managers will be people from Crystal City. Mr. Cuellar also stated that if another entity takes over the

campus they may want to hire their own staff. A motion was made to send a letter of intent to partner with an outside entity. The motion failed with a 3 to 4 with Guerrero, R. Espinosa, Cuellar and Castillo voting against it. Mrs. Guerrero

stated that she has seen the other campus come out of IR and she is going to support the Zavala campus just like the other board members have done in the past with the other campuses.

The board considered re-

aligning the board by having holding elections. Board President Eduardo Cuellar stated that the elections are usually held in November. Board Member Jose Uribes stated that the board should consider realigning due to the

lack of leadership under Mr. Cuellar. He stated that he has not seen any improvement in the way the board conducts their business. He stated that a board member has to go through an "act of congress"

County receives grant for improvements

The County of Zavala County Commissioners Court during their February 14th Meeting, approved and signed a County Proclamation for support of "Fair Housing Month" for support of civil rights to fair and equal housing opportunities in Zavala County.

"It is important that in our capacity as elected county officials, that we support all housing efforts and infrastructure improvements that will provide a better living environment for all our county communities and not discriminate because of color, sex, or religion, stated Judge Luna.

community needs, recently received a grant from the Texas Department of Agriculture Community Development Block Grant Program, to address the infrastructure needs in the Loma Grande Subdivision. The \$275,000 TDA grant and \$55,000 County match will provide \$330,000 for the street improvements project.

County Commissioner Mike Acosta expressed his appreciation to the Middle Rio Grande Development Council for the hard work demonstrated in developing the grant applications and addressing the community needs of Zavala County and the region.

Staying healthy amid the flu outbreak

We all know that we need to wash our hands to avoid getting the flu, but there are other, lesser-known things we also can do to stay healthy, said Dr. Azadeh Stark, an epidemiologist who teaches public health at The University of Texas at Dallas. Dr. Stark advises:

Wear a surgical mask – This common practice in Asian countries creates a barrier that can decrease susceptibility to flu virus and other airborne pathogens.

Expand your personal zone—Keep your distance at about two feet while interacting with others. Shorter distances can increase the likelihood of infection because of a higher likelihood of breathing and ingesting the other person's expelled microscopic bodily fluid.

Avoid caffeinated beverages – Caffeine and alcohol reduce the volume of water

expelled from the body and can cause dehydration. The mucous membranes in our mouths, nasal passages and skin are the first line of defense and need to be hydrated to be healthy.

“Our susceptibility to flu virus and other pathogens increases with dehydration, physical fatigue and poor dietary habits. Protection starts with careful attention to the quality and quantity of our food and beverage and prevention of physical exhaustion,” Stark said.

HOW IS FLU SPREAD. Along with this year's flu outbreak are misconceptions about how the virus is transmitted. Dr. Azadeh Stark, an epidemiologist who teaches public health at The University of Texas at Dallas, explains how the flu can spread through microscopic human bodily fluids.

“Human bodily fluid con-

tains mostly water; we expel human bodily fluid when we exhale and speak. These tiny particles can stay suspended in the air or adhere onto various surfaces for several hours. Therefore, on regular basis, we ingest and inhale bodily fluids from others and even animals. However, because of our exceptional human immune system, in most cases we do not pick up diseases,” Stark said.

She added that this year's flu season has become an epidemic because most of us have not had previous exposure to this year's H3N2 strain of the flu virus. “Our immune system does not have the needed memories or blue prints to synthesize antibodies against this strain of virus. Therefore, we are more susceptible to flu when exposed to these tiny particles, especially from flu-stricken individuals,” Stark said.







Former Maverick County Attorney Ricardo Jose Ramos while serving as Civil General Counsel of Maverick County allowed for a default judgment be entered against Maverick County in a federal district court case, styled Jose Cabello et al v. Maverick County et al. "The record also shows that Mr. Ramos did nothing and forced the Court to enter the Default Judgment. A total of nine months and 20 days spanned Mr. Ramos' inaction and inattention."

Ludlum states: "instead of pursuing an immediate remedy, [Defendants] remained in the background for six additional months." "...the reality is the Defendants, aware of deficiencies chose to remain silent for half a year before seeking any recourse. That is no mistake-that is a calculated decision."

As a result of this default judgment entered against Maverick County, Maverick County filed a lawsuit against Ricardo Jose Ramos in state district court in Maverick County, Texas, styled Maverick County v. Ricardo Ramos, Individually and D/B/A The Ramos Law Firm, for negligence seeking to be reimbursed for the damages and attorney's fees of \$17, 424, sustained by Maverick County taxpayers caused by Ricardo Jose Ramos' negligence in the federal district court case of Jose Cabello. This case remains pending in state district court.

In another federal court case styled United States of America v. Ricardo Jose Ramos, Cause No. DR-04-CR-020-AML, the federal district court judge found that "Ricardo Jose Ramos knowingly and intentionally committed obstruction of the administration of justice." The federal district court judge Ordered that "Ricardo Jose Ramos is in contempt of this Court and shall be sentenced accordingly. Mr. Ramos is hereby sentenced to time served and shall pay a fine in the amount of \$1,500."

Dimmit, Maverick, and Zavala Counties' voters deserve better than the poor record of Candidate Ricardo Jose Ramos for the 293rd Judicial District Court Judge position.

This March 6th Primary Election, starting February 20th through March 2nd for Early Voting Period, the voters must uphold the integrity of our next 293rd District Court Judge to a Higher Standard.

Legislation Brings Cotton Back into Title I of the Farm Bill-Important for Zavala County

By Congress for their passing the Bipartisan Budget Act on Friday February 9th, a move that keeps the government in operation and also provides necessary a critical component for cotton producers is a provision within the Act that provides for seed cotton to be made eligible for farm programs under the commodity title of the Farm Bill, restoring a much needed safety net to Zavala County cotton growers effective with the 2018 crop year. This is significant

for cotton growers who for years have operated without a viable safety net, and this will allow many growers to stay in business. Cotton producers should be receiving additional information about the act by direct mail. Reminder Texas A&M AgriLife Extension and PSA Water Summit Next Week

The Zavala County office of the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension in collaboration with the Produce Safety Alliance will be hosting a Water Summit on February 27-28, 2018, to identify concerns, needs of growers, sources of information and support, and the rules for assessing produce safety hazard risks for covered produce related to water use under the FDA Food Safety

Modernization Act (FSMA) Final Rule - Standards for the Growing, Harvesting, Packing and Holding of Produce for Human Consumption (21 CFR §112). The two-day Water Summit is an engagement opportunity for growers, regulatory personnel, industry representatives, educators, and researchers to increase understanding and work collaboratively to develop ideas that support risk reduction related to water used during the production of fruits and vegetables. This Water Summit will include informational presentations and breakout discussions. Participants will explore challenges related to the FSMA Produce Safety Rule Subpart E - Agricultural Water requirements and discuss potential solutions that are workable, while still protecting public health.

Through collaboration with the four Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA) Regional Centers, and the Indigenous Food and Agriculture Initiative, multiple remote breakout session sites will be held, including multiple locations in Texas to facilitate more growers participating. The Texas A&M AgriLife Research and Extension Center in Uvalde will be one of the remote sites. These remote site sessions will meet on the same dates (Feb. 27-28, 2018), stream the meeting live to their location, and conduct breakout

groups at the same time as the Water Summit attendees in Covington, KY. Information from these groups will be fed into the meeting in real time so that their feedback can be integrated into the meeting outcomes. Tip of the Week: Selecting Vegetable Varieties For Zavala County Gardens

Weather conditions with mild temperatures had many of us feeling the garden bug and started preparing the garden for this summer vegetable planting. Hopefully all of you have already done a soil test and you know what your soil has or what it needs to make this summer garden season a truly successful one. Assuming you have already done so now you need to decide what varieties do best in our area. Here a few tips.

Even before deciding on what varieties to plant a good plan is the first step in establishing a flourishing home vegetable garden. Planning includes selecting the garden location; deciding on the size of the garden; determining the types and varieties of vegetables to plant; and planning where, when, and how much of each vegetable to plant in the garden. Remember garden size Making the garden too large is one of the most common mistakes of enthusiastic, first-time gardeners. A garden that is too large will be too much work. When determining the size of your garden, consider

these factors: Available room. For apartment dwellers, the garden may be a planter box. In a suburban or rural area, however, there may be plenty of ground space for a garden. Available time. If the only time you have for gardening is after work or school, or on weekends, there may not be enough time to care for a large garden. Family size. If gardening is a family activity, a large space can be cared for. A larger family also can use more vegetables.

Reason for gardening. If the garden is purely a recreational activity, a container or flower bed garden may be big enough. If you want to grow vegetables for canning or freezing, a bigger area is needed. Types of vegetables to be grown. Some vegetables take a lot of room. Most need at least 3 feet of space between rows. If you want to plant ten rows of vegetables, the garden must be 30 feet wide. The smaller the garden, the more important it is to get high production from each row. Small, fast-maturing crops such as radishes, turnips and beets yield quickly and do not require much space. Tomatoes, bush beans, squash and peppers require more space but produce over a long season.

This is especially important if the garden is purely for recreation or personal enjoyment. Grow vegetables your family likes to eat. Now the varieties. Selecting the right tomato, squash and other vegetables that grow well in the Zavala County area has been made easy thanks to our Vegetable Variety Selector. First go to https://aggie-horticulture.tamu.edu/publications/veg_variety/ Select Zavala county from the drop down menu or select a general region from the list. If variety data is not available for your specific county, then regional data will be returned instead. This regional data will give you varieties for the whole region but is still reliable in making your variety selection. Once you have decided on a variety to plant remember that some vegetables produce more than others so fewer plants will be needed. The amount to plant depends on family size, expected production, and whether or not you plan to do any freezing or canning. Do not plant too much. Over-planting is wasteful and takes too much work. Have a wonderful spring planting your garden and wish you much success. Have a great week. M.V.

Child, 4 adults shot outside Texas restaurant

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A masked shooter opened fire on a family waiting to be seated at a San Antonio restaurant, wounding a 6-year-old boy and four of his relatives, police said Monday.

Police Chief William McManus said shortly after the Sunday night shooting that the boy was shot in the leg and was expected to survive, but that two of the adults' injuries were life-threatening. He said investigators don't believe the shooting was random.

The child, two men and two women were sitting on a

bench outside a Texas Roadhouse when they were struck by gunfire around 8:40 p.m., according to a preliminary police report released Monday.

The suspect walked up to a nearby parking lot and fired multiple rounds from a handgun before fleeing, according to the report. Police said the suspect was about 15 feet (4.6 meters) from the front of the restaurant when he opened fire.

Police said the suspect hasn't been identified and remains at large.

The child and four adults

were taken by emergency responders to University Hospital in San Antonio, while the fifth victim, a 27-year-old man, was later discovered at the hospital after transporting himself, according to the report. Police said the adults ranged in age from 22 to 50.

Police said Monday that they had no immediate updates on the victims' conditions. Citing hospital policy, a spokeswoman for University Hospital said Monday that she couldn't confirm whether the victims were being treated at the facility.

Texas teen arrested on charges of bringing firearm to school

MIDLAND, Texas (AP) — A Midland, Texas, high school student arrested on felony charges of having a firearm on school grounds has bonded out of jail.

Midland County court records show Ostyn Jacob Williams was being held on a \$10,000 bond for a third-degree felony weapons charge and a \$10,000 bond

for a third-degree felony of tampering with physical evidence. He bonded out Thursday.

The Midland Reporter-Telegram reports that the 17-year-old Midland High School student was arrested Tuesday after school district police received a tip that a student had a firearm on campus.

The campus was placed on lockdown.

According to Williams' arrest affidavit, officers found a .40-caliber Taurus semi-automatic weapon behind a dictionary in a classroom.

It was not clear whether Williams had an attorney.

A conviction carries a maximum 10-year prison sentence.

Teens arrested for threats against Houston areas schools

RICHMOND, Texas (AP) — Authorities say two teenagers accused in separate incidents of making threats through social media to harm people at two Houston area schools have been arrested.

In one incident, investigators with the Fort Bent County Sheriff's Office allege a 14-year-old student sent a message on Snapchat Friday morning indicating he was going to shoot a middle school in Missouri City.

In the other incident, a

15-year-old is accused of sending a message Friday afternoon through Snapchat that contained an image of students fleeing the deadly school shooting in Parkland, Florida. The student claimed the same would happen at a

charter school in Katy.

The sheriff's office says the students were each charged with making a terroristic threat, a felony.

Both students are in being held in a juvenile detention facility.




