Woman sentenced 5 years for voting while on probation

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — A Texas woman was sentenced to five years in prison for voting in the 2016 presidential election when she was ineligible because she was on probation.

Crystal Mason, 43, will appeal the punishment handed down this past week in Fort Worth, according to her attorney. Mason is a former tax preparer who was previously convicted in 2012 on charges related to inflating refunds for clients.

She testified that she didn't know people convicted of felonies can't vote until they complete their sentence, The Fort Worth Star-Telegram reported. She told the newspaper last year following her indictment that she had gone

to vote at her mother's encouragement and wasn't told when released from federal prison that she could not cast a ballot.

Mason's illegal voting case was prosecuted in Tarrant County, the same place where a Mexican national last year was sentenced to eight years in prison over illegal voting. Voting illegally in Texas is a second-degree felony punishable by up to 20 years in prison.

Mason used a provisional ballot to vote, and it was not counted. She has said that she believes she was being targeted for prosecution because she voted for Democrat Hillary Clinton over Republican Donald Trump for president.

SWTJC offers new Patient Care Technician Program

Employment of healthcare occupations is projected to grow 18 percent from 2016 to 2026, adding about 2.4 million new jobs, according to the US Department of Labor.

To meet the high demand for healthcare jobs, Southwest Texas Junior College will launch the new Patient Care Technician (PCT) Program at the beginning of the Fall 2018 semester.

The (PCT) Program offers students the opportunity to acquire three national certifications and one state certification under one program.

Certifications include certified phlebotomy technician (CPT), certified medical assistant (CMA) and certified electrocardiogram technician

(CET) through the National Healthcareer Association. The certified nurse assistant (CNA) will be certified by the Texas Department of Aging and Disability Services.

The PCT Program will only be available in Uvalde with plans to expand to Eagle Pass and Del Rio by the fall of 2019.

Classes will be held Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., with the second section running from 5 p.m. to 9 p.m. Students are required to participate in clinical rotations at hospitals or nursing homes.

"Students are required to be 18 years old or older and must have a high school diploma or high school equivalency diploma to enter the program,"

said JJ Suarez, Allied Health Human Services Division Chair.

Suarez added, "The two major advantages of this program are, the program is now covered by Pell Grants, which was not before, and a student can acquire four certifications under one program."

According to Suarez, previously the four programs were offered separately through the Workforce Training & Development Division and were not covered by Pell Grants.

Aldridge, Gay help Spurs beat league-best Rockets 100-83

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — The Spurs took advantage of a Houston Rockets team that admitted to a lapse of focus after recently clinching the best record in the Western Conference, and pulled out a crucial win in its own playoff push.

LaMarcus Aldridge had 23 points and 14 rebounds and Rudy Gay added 21 points as San Antonio held Houston to its lowest-scoring game of the season, beating the Rockets 100-83 to snap their 11-game winning streak.

"We've been through some ups and downs this season, but we're picking up at the right time," Gay said. "There is no better time than this. This is when teams make or break themselves."

The Spurs winners of eight of their last 10, remained fourth in the Western Conference after preventing a season sweep by the Rockets, who have the NBA's best record with a franchise-best wins total.

There appeared to be a bit of a hangover after the Rockets clinched the West's top seed following Golden State's loss to Milwaukee on Thursday.

"(The Spurs) played 10 times harder than we did," Houston coach Mike D'An-

toni said. "Looked like a team trying to stay in the playoffs at a good spot and (Rockets) like a team that's already got it sewn up and we played that way. If we play that way Tuesday we'll get our rears busted again."

San Antonio outscored Houston 19-8 to open the fourth quarter in taking a 94-74 lead with 5 minutes remaining. D'Antoni opted to take his starters out two minutes later, but they struggled prior to the late benching.

Houston shot 34 percent from the field and was 7 for 31 on 3-pointers.

"They do a good job of trying to run us off the line," Rockets star James Harden said. "They played much harder than us. They're fighting for a playoff spot as well. Credit them, they came out and played well tonight."

Harden scored 25 points for Houston on 8-of-19 shooting. He also had eight assists, but dealt with foul trouble before exiting with five fouls. Eric Gordon added 18 points for the Rockets.

Houston was without injured Chris Paul and San Antonio was without Kawhi Leonard, who has played in only nine games this season.

Gay scored six points in two minutes bridging the first and second quarters, including what became a four-point

play. Gay rebounded his own missed free throw after making the first and was fouled on a layup. He made the ensuing free throw.

Gay finished 9 for 13 and had three rebounds and two steals.

"He was tremendous today," Spurs forward Kyle Anderson said. "You could see him kind of take over the game."

Gay later blocked a shot and then raced downcourt for a slam dunk that brought a thunderous response from the home crowd and led to a timeout by D'Antoni.

Dejounte Murray had 13 points and six rebounds for the Spurs. Murray scored four of his first six points against Harden, driving twice past the Rockets star for a layup.

"You've just got to play game to game," Aldridge said. "You can't get too high, too low. We've got to take this intensity and this focus on the road and try to get two wins on the road."

TIP-INS

Rockets: Houston's previous low point total came in a 103-89 loss to Memphis on Oct. 28. ... Paul missed the game with a sore left leg. D'Antoni said the star guard is "not quite there but looking very good for Tuesday" against Washington. ... P.J. Tucker remained in the game despite taking an elbow to the top of the head and later crashing to the floor after a rebound. ... Gerald Green tweaked his right ankle with about two minutes left in the first half while scrambling for a loose ball. Green shoved Danny Green to force a stoppage and exit the game, gingerly walking on his right ankle. Gerald Green played 14 minutes in the second half.

Spurs: San Antonio has at least 45 wins in 19 straight seasons, the longest streak in league history. ... Popovich said he is unsure when Leonard and "his group" will clear the forward to play as Leonard continues his rehabilitation in New York with his own team of doctors.

TIME TO STOP

Harden says the Rockets have been coasting recently despite winning their previous 11 games. And it needs to come to an end.

"It's time to amp it back up a little bit and just get our minds and our bodies right and be ready to go," Harden said.

FEELING LIKE HIS OLD SELF

Gay demonstrated he is returning to full health with a resounding dunk and thunderous block against the Rockets.

Gay ruptured his left Achilles tendon in January while playing with the Sacramento Kings, but has worked himself back to health while coming off the bench for San Antonio.

"I guess they're back," Gay said of his hops. "I think I told someone that last game, I'm really starting to feel like myself."

Tarrant County leans Republican.

Mason's attorney, J. Warren St. John, did not immediately return a phone message Saturday.

Voter fraud convictions are rare, but Texas Republicans leaders have zealously pursued a crackdown on illegal voting in recent years. A federal judge has twice blocked Texas' voter ID law, including a revised version last year that was backed by the Trump administration.

At the time of the 2016 election, Mason was on probation after pleading guilty to

defrauding the federal government in 2011. She served nearly three years in prison on a five-year sentence. After her prison release, she was put on a three-year term of supervised release. She also had to pay \$4.2 million in restitution, according to court documents.

Mason testified that when she voted in November 2016, she signed a provisional ballot affidavit stating that she had not been convicted of a felony. Prosecutors said she signed the form with the intent to vote illegally, but Mason's attorney called it a mistake.



News from your County Agent

Easter has come and gone and I hope all of you had a nice Easter weekend. According to statisticbrain.com total annual spending on Easter candy is about \$2.1 Billion in the United States which means that if you are like most folks you will be enjoying left over Easter candy for a while perhaps even into the 4th of July weekend.

At least a pleasant Easter surprise was much appreciated by those of you that were fortunate enough to get some measurable rainfall late last week, making things a lot greener for most of us just in time for Easter.

Steer Tag Orders Being Taken Now

Currently major show steer tag orders are being taken at the Zavala County Office of the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service. There will be only one tag order for Zavala County for these tags. Steer exhibitors that plan to show a steer project in any major show in Texas must have their steer projects validated with an official state steer validation tag.

Those of you that will show a steer project in Zavala County ONLY and will not show outside of Zavala County DO NOT need to order a state validation tag. Validation fee for Steers \$15 per head if ordered from April 1-April 20.

Tags will go up to \$25 per head for orders placed from April 21-June 23. Both major show and county show steers will be validated on Saturday June 23, 2018. Extension Reminds Producers to Keep Eye Out for Respiratory Acidosis in Newborns at Calving Time

Despite a cow-calf producer's best efforts relative to providing desired herd genetics and ease of birthing through bull selection and heifer development, some cows or heifers still need assistance at calving time. It's important to remember that every baby calf has a certain degree of respiratory acidosis, one reason why producers need to keep as close an eye as possible on newborns. Acidosis is the re-

sult of oxygen deprivation and accumulation of carbon dioxide that results from passage of the calf through the birth canal. The excess of carbon dioxide results in a buildup of lactic acid.

Typically, a healthy calf will pant vigorously shortly after birth, its body working to auto-correct the lack of oxygen and the excess of carbon dioxide and its by-products. Unfortunately, some calves may be sluggish and slow to begin this corrective process. It's imperative that newborn calves begin to breathe as soon as possible, and that means producers need to be both watchful and knowledgeable about how to render assistance. To stimulate the initiation of the respiratory process, first manually clear the newborn calf's mouth and nasal passages of fluids and mucus.

The old timers method of hanging the calf over a fence is not the best method to initiate breathing even if some swear that it works, but it is not the best method. The weight of the calf on the fence restricts the movement of the animal's diaphragm muscle. This diaphragm activity is necessary to expand the lungs to draw in needed oxygen.

A better method is to briskly tickle the inside of the calf's nostrils with a straw. This will usually initiate a reflex action such as a snort or cough in the newborn, expanding its lungs and allowing air to enter. Expect the calf to pant rapidly for a few minutes after the snort or cough, panting is the natural response, increasing oxygen intake and promoting carbon dioxide release and allowing the calf to reach normal blood gas concentrations. Good luck to all during this calving season.

Tip of the Week: Timely Spring Fertilizer Applications for a Lush Lawn

Lawn quality is generally measured in terms of color, density and uniformity. Cultural practices, particularly fertilization, largely determine lawn quality. A fertilization program should include timely fertilizer applications in amounts and formulations that meet the requirements of your lawn. Excessive nitrogen applications stimulate production of leaves and stems and increase the mowing requirements. Higher water re-

quirements, increased thatch and increased susceptibility to insects and diseases also results from excessive application of nitrogen. Poor timing of fertilizer applications, such as mid-summer and early fall applications of soluble nitrogen, also increases the likelihood of chinch bug and brownpatch problems in St. Augustine lawns.

In the Zavala County area in early spring there is usually enough residual nitrogen to maintain grass through several mowings. The first application of fertilizer should be made after the second or third mowing. If the lawn appears vigorous and healthy at that time, delay the first application until May. In the absence of soil test information, apply a fertilizer with a 3-1-2 or 2-1-1 ratio at a rate equivalent to 1 pound of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet.

Bermudagrass lawns require supplemental applications of nitrogen at 45- to 60-day intervals between spring and fall fertilizations. These applications should not exceed 1 pound of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet per application. Occasionally, St. Augustine grass may need a supplemental application of nitrogen to enhance color during the summer. Use organic or slow-release nitrogen sources on lawns during the summer.

Summer fertilization of St. Augustine grass growing in moderate shade should be avoided because of increased disease activity. St. Augustine lawns may require periodic applications of iron sulfate or iron chelate to prevent iron chlorosis. A foliar application of iron sulfate at a rate of 6 to 8 ounces per 1,000 square feet effectively eliminates the symptoms of iron chlorosis. These applications may be needed several times during the growing season.

Iron chelates should be applied according to the manufacturer's directions.

Fertilizers can be distributed with a broadcast (cyclone) or drop-type spreader. Uniform distribution is essential to prevent light and dark streaks across the lawn. For better distribution, divide the fertilizer to be applied into two equal lots. Apply one lot lengthwise and the other crosswise over the lawn like a checkered pattern. Choice of

the type and grade of fertilizer material to use depends on soil test recommendations. In every fertilizer analysis (such as 12-4-8), the first number represents the percent nitrogen (N), the second number represents the percent phosphorus (P₂O₅) and the third number represents the percent potassium (K₂O). This is why a soil test is so

important so that you know what your lawn needs and how much. Contact the Zavala County office of the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service on instructions and information on how to have a soil test down for your lawn.

Remember timing and distribution of fertilizer applications, as well as rate of application, are import-

ant considerations in a lawn fertilization program. Timing applications of fertilizers needs to correspond to grass requirements rather than to the convenience of the homeowner can reduce maintenance problems during the growing season.



THIS WAS THE NEWS

From the Files of the Zavala County Sentinel

JUNE 18, 1937

Mrs. Clyde Tate and A. A. Cummins of Crystal City sang at the dedication service of the new pipe organ at the First Baptist Church is Uvalde Sunday. This organ was recently installed. The late J. R. Raine, father of Mrs. Tate, started a pipe organ fund for the church before his death.

An old time revival meeting will begin Friday night at the Bermuda school house. Mrs. Lillie Northcutt is in charge of the services.

Interest in flax as a supplemental crop to spinach is growing here and there is talk of trying to get 1,000 acres planted in the Crystal City area next fall.

George Light Sr. has reported that in drilling the well on the Light Ranch near Cotulla the drillers encountered a 16-foot vein of coal. An analysis shows it to be good anthracite. The only other known deposits of this grade coal are in Pennsylvania and Alsace-Lorraine.

At Batesville, Mrs. Maude Jones is having the plaza Hotel remodeled and repainted. A new barber shop is being put in the building just west of the Plaza Hotel with Cleo Jones in charge. A rooming house has been put in by Mrs. Ollie Jones in the building known as the Pincham Place.

JUNE 18, 1948

From some unknown cause fire broke out Tuesday afternoon inside a small storeroom at the rear of Crystal City Cafe and almost completely destroyed its store of groceries and beer belonging to the cafe.

The Barnes Plumbing Company recently sold their building on E. Zavala St. to L.L. Williams and Willard Lunz and erected a new building on Hwy 83.

JUNE 14, 1957

Formal dedication ceremonies for the Crystal City Little League Field were held Monday night. The City of Crystal City provided the site and a tremendous amount of work has been done by many individuals and organizations to make the field one of the most outstanding in the state.

Eight members of the 1957 graduating class of Crystal City High School enlisted in the Air Force on June 5. They were David Gomez, Reynaldo Loera, Harold Chapman, Billy Templer, Larry Northcatt, Wayne Lemmons, James Spradling, and Johnny Hale.

JUNE 15, 1967

C.Q. (Charlie) Crawford Jr. will become a member of Crystal City's five-man council replacing Moses Falcon as the result of a vote contest suit which finished up in District Court Tuesday Afternoon.

Ex-Texas education worker sentenced in child porn case

DALLAS (AP) — A former education worker in Texas has been sentenced to more than 11 years in prison for possessing child pornography.

Federal prosecutors an-

nounced Friday that Neal Edmond Brown was sentenced this week following his guilty plea in November 2017 to possession of prepubescent child pornography.

The 46-year-old Brown

had been the director of school finance operations for the Region 16 Education Service Center in Amarillo. The center is part of a network of state facilities that meet the needs of local school districts.

According to a plea agreement, authorities discovered Brown had been uploading child pornography from his work computer.

Authorities seized several electronic devices from Brown's office in June 2017 and found the devices contained over 900 images of child pornography and over 200 videos of child pornography.



Medicare can help you find the right health care providers

How many times do we rely on the Internet to answer life's little questions, such as which movies to see or where to go for dinner? So, why not use it to help settle some of the bigger questions, like which nursing homes, hospitals and doctors to turn to for our care?

Four in five Internet users already search the web for information about diseases or medical problems. Taking that one step further and using the Internet to compare health care providers seems

perfectly reasonable, as long as you can trust the websites you're visiting.

Medicare's "Compare" website fills the bill. It's a good place to begin your research when looking for a nursing home, hospital, home health agency or other health care provider.

Nursing Home Compare (medicare.gov/nursinghomecompare) gives you detailed information on 17,000 nursing homes nationwide. You can find out about a facility's recent health and safety inspections, its staffing levels and the quality of its care, such as whether residents have gotten their flu shots, are in pain or are losing weight. The website uses a star-rat-

ing system to point out the differences between nursing homes. The best homes score five stars; the worst receive one.

Hospital Compare (medicare.gov/hospitalcompare) puts 4,700 hospitals under the magnifying glass, allowing you to see how facilities fare on many indicators of quality care. You can learn, for example, how often patients who were admitted to a particular hospital because of heart attacks return within a month of discharge. An unusually low, or high, percentage could say something about how well, or poorly, the hospital treated the problem during the first stay.

In an emergency, you need to go to the nearest hospital. But when you do have time, it's worth discussing with your doctor which hospital best meets your needs. If you're considering one facility, you may want to know what recent patients thought of their care. Hospital Compare measures customer satisfaction by using survey responses from patients. You can find out, for instance, how well a hospital's patients thought the doctors and nurses keep them informed or managed their pain.

Home Health Compare (medicare.gov/homehealthcompare) lets you locate home health care agencies in your area and check on the types of services they offer and the quality of their care. Your doctor, hospital discharge planner or social worker can make some recommendations. But the statistics on Home Health Compare will help you follow up and confirm how well

an agency's patients recover from illnesses or injuries and resume their everyday activities.

Hospice Compare (medicare.gov/hospicecompare) displays information on almost 3,900 hospices nationwide. It lets patients and their caregivers see how the hospice services they are considering stack up against the national average when it comes to such quality measures as managing pain, treating symptoms and respecting patients' beliefs and values. The website also has a list of questions to ask when choosing a hospice program.


Physician Compare (medicare.gov/physiciancompare) allows you to search for doctors who provide Medicare-covered services. You can find basic facts about individuals and group practices, such as their business addresses, medical specialties, clinical training and hospital affiliations. And you can check how well certain group practices perform specific tasks, like controlling blood sugar in patients with diabetes. Also available are patient survey scores that cover issues such as how well clinicians communicate.

Medicare's Compare website contains information on several other types of health care providers, such as dialysis facilities, long-term care hospitals and inpatient rehabilitation facilities. Convenience is important, so look at facilities near your home. But also pay close attention to the quality-of-care measures. In the case of long-term care hospitals and inpatient rehabilitation facilities, for example, you'll want to look at how often patients get infections or pressure ulcers.

As helpful as the Compare website is, it isn't meant to be the final word on a nursing home or a hospital or a physician's quality of care. It's simply a screening tool that lets you focus on a few providers that interest you, so that you can make an informed decision about your care.
