Crystal City internment camp survivors pilgrimage and protest

The Crystal City Internment Camp was active from 1942 until 1945. At the height of World War II, the government decided to isolate the fathers of families who were of German, Italian and Japanese ancestry, their families soon followed. Thousands of people were confined to the fences that bordered the small community within Crystal City during the years it was open. Families were separated during the movement of people between the different camps at different locations in the United States. Crystal City Internment Camp survivors and ancestors are advocating for awareness in America to prevent similar camps from continuing their operations in the United States.



A large group of Americans with Japanese ancestry have pilgrimaged from California to Texas in their efforts to bring a human rights message of equality. Sister Denise LaRock, a Daughter of Charity of St. Vincent de Paul, and works with the Interfaith Welcome Coalition in San Antonio opened the memorial ceremony at the Crystal City Internment Camp site which now is home to the Crystal City Independent School District's various campuses. LaRock stated in her opening comments about the Japanese visitors who were kept against their will at these camps in the 1940s, "But instead of being filled with hate, you are filled with compassion instead.

And you are here today, this afternoon to use your experiences

News from your County Agent

Just when we thought winter was in the books we get another dose of cold weather over the weekend into early Monday and Tuesday mornings. What a way to usher in the month of April and unfortunately no rain was associated with the weather change but our chances for rainfall are back on the calendar set for this weekend specifically on Saturday. I am sure that this should be the last of the cold fronts making their way to our area and most professional weather experts agree, and we can officially wave good bye to the cold weather for the rest of the year. Spring Private Well Water Screening to be held April 18th

Do you have your own water well? Have you had it screened lately? If this is your case then you might want to consider participating in our multi-county water screening event coming to you soon. The Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service is hosting a water well screening on April 18, 2019 at the Zavala County office of the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service at 221 N 1st Ave in Crystal City, to give area residents the

opportunity to have their well water tested.

Results will be available on April 19th after 4:00 p.m. at the County Extension Office. The screening is presented by the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service. "Private water wells should be tested annually," said John W. Smith, AgriLife Extension Program Specialist. "It is very important that only sampling bags from the Zavala County AgriLife Extension office be used and all instructions for proper sampling are followed to ensure accurate results."

I suggest that area residents who want to have their well water screened, pick up a sample bag and sampling instructions from the Zavala County AgriLife Extension office (830-374-2883). The cost is \$15 per sample and samples must be turned between 8 and 9 a.m. on April 17th. Samples will be screened for common contaminants, including fecal coliform bacteria, nitrates, high salinity and presence of hydrocarbons.

The presence of fecal coliform bacteria in water indicates that waste from humans or warm-blooded animals may have contaminated the water. Water contaminated with fecal coliform bacteria is more likely to also have pathogens present that can cause diarrhea, cramps, nausea or other symptoms. Water with nitrates at levels of 10 parts per million is

considered unsafe for human consumption, nitrate levels above 10 parts per million can disrupt the ability of blood to carry oxygen throughout the body, resulting in a condition called methemoglobinemia. Infants less than 6 months of age and young livestock are most susceptible. Salinity as measured by total dissolved solids will also be determined for each sample. Water with high levels may leave deposits and have a salty taste, and using water with high levels for irrigation may damage soil or plants. Remember free water collections bags and instructions may be picked up at the Zavala county office of the Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service at 221 N 1st Ave in Crystal City, Texas.

Tip of the Week: Changes for Tax Filing by Agriculture Producers

We all know that tax time is right around the corner for most of us. Farmers on the other hand have a few different tax issues to deal with unlike most of the general public. For starters the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has waived the estimated tax penalty for qualifying farmers who file their return and pay any taxes due by April 15, 2019. Typically, agricultural producers who have not made tax deposits can file and pay taxes due by March 1 without penalty. Due to certain changes in the new tax law, farmers may have had difficulty determining their tax liability by the typical March 1 deadline. This waiver gives producers more time for income tax preparation. To be granted this relief, you must be a qualifying farmer and get at least two-thirds of your gross income from farming. A cash-rent landlord is not considered a farmer. In addition to the waived tax penalty, there are several items for income tax preparation regarding the new tax law changes which I have listed below:

- Tax rates have decreased for 2018.
- Agricultural producers now are allowed to use 200 percent declining balance depreciation for three-year, five-

year, seven-year and 10-year property. The 150 percent declining balance method is still required for 15- and 20-year property.

- For most new agricultural machinery and equipment (except grain bins), the recovery period has been reduced from seven to five years.

- Like-kind exchanges no longer are allowed for personal property but still are allowed for real property.

- The section 179 expense has increased. It generally allows producers to deduct up to \$1,000,000 on new or used machinery or equipment purchased in the tax year. There is a dollar-for-dollar phase-out for purchases above \$2,500,000.

- The additional 100 percent first-year bonus depreciation is in effect. It is now available for used as well as new property. It is equal to 100 percent of the adjusted basis after any section 179 expensing.

Other items to note:

- Income averaging can be used by producers to spread the tax liability to lower income tax brackets in the three previous years. This is done on schedule J.

- Crop insurance proceeds and government crop disaster payments can be deferred to the next tax year if a producer is a cash-basis taxpayer and can show that normally income from damaged crops would be included in a tax year following the year of the damage.

- A livestock income deferral is available for those who had a forced sale of livestock because of a weather-related disaster.

Small Business "What You Need to Know"

Last week my granddaughter asked for my help with an essay she was to write. I sat down and had to think about the topic assigned, "Optimism". I believe I am always an optimist, but could not really give her an accurate response, so I looked it up! The definition of optimism is a noun:

- Hopefulness and confidence about the future
- Best of all possible worlds

After reading the definition I was even more confused on how to answer her questions

and assist her in the best way I could. I did more research and found a quote from Winston Churchill, "A pessimist sees the *difficulty* in every opportunity and an optimist sees the *opportunity* in every difficulty."

After she went on her way to write her essay, I began to think about how being optimistic in business is what I do my best to coach entrepreneurs who ask for my assistance. Sometimes pure optimism is not always the

appropriate temperament. As my research deepened, the relationship between optimism and being a real owner-manager of your business and skillfully influence the successful day to day operations, sometimes you must have that difficult conversation with a team-member you have been putting off too long and performance and quality is beginning to diminish. According to Monica Williams, *Resourceful Manager*, never let the employee take control of the conversation by crying, shouting, using foul language, silence, not being truthful, denial, or even become threatening.

As the owner, your investment and return hinges on your success as an employer and coach for your team. Not unlike a sports coach, tightening the reins and taking the bull by the horns is sometimes the toughest task in entrepreneurship. The best advice-"JUST DO IT, DON'T DELAY" It is very difficult to recover a lost customer due to an unpleasant experience with an employee and that customer will not keep those feelings to him or herself.

This leads us to "constructive criticism versus just plain criticism". When you schedule a private conversation or "coaching" session, set yourself some ground rules:

- Do not blurt out what you have heard to or what prompted the conversation
 - Take a few minutes to remember that feedback is a powerful tool in determining what actually occurred
 - One incident
 - On-going behaviors
 - Control your reaction to the response you get from asking the "tough" questions and listen carefully
 - By listening to the employee's point of view, you can better understand the situation
 - Respond with your feedback very carefully, take a deep breath and say something like, "I understand you did not realize your behavior was causing issues with the team and or the customers". Then go into detail with expectations, firmly, yet not aggressively. Be solutions based.
- Above all-BE OPTIMISTIC**

Representative King's statement on House Budget

State Representative Tracy O. King (D-Uvalde) voted in favor of House Bill 1, the two-year state appropriations bill that passed the House in true bi-partisan fashion with a 149-0 vote.

"The Legislature has the obligation to produce a budget for the next biennium," said Representative Tracy O. King. "After nearly 12 hours of productive debate, the Texas House passed its budget."

The general appropriations bill consists of the State's main spending priorities which totals \$251 billion. The two-year spending plan highlights a \$9 billion boost in state funding for public education. Of that, \$6 billion would go to school districts, and the remaining \$3 billion would pay for property tax relief, contingent on the passage of a school finance reform package.

Other items the House voted in support of are various expenditures for health and mental care services, increased formula funding for higher education, and funds for the TEXAS Grants program to name a few.

"I'm very proud to have voted for HB1, which takes a principled, fiscally responsible approach to funding priorities including school finance, school safety, mental health & more," said King. "Once the Senate approves House Bill 1, the two chambers will meet in conference committee to negotiate the best budget for Texas."

CRIME ZAVALA COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT

• March 2, 2019 at approx. 9:50 p.m., Deputy Picazo conducted a traffic stop on a Black in color Honda Civic for a moving violation, speeding at 100 mph on US 83 south of La Pryor. Upon contact, the driver was identified as Zelyna Soto. It was discovered she had an infant child approximately five months old in a car seat but was not secured properly in the car. The seat was facing forward and not the rear as required. Further interview with Soto discovered two alcoholic beverages in the vehicle, one which was opened. Picazo requested that Soto exit the vehicle to perform a field sobriety test. Soto performed poorly on all three tests displaying clues that indicated that she was intoxicated. Soto was placed under arrest and was transported to Zavala County Sheriff's Office to wait for her father to pick up her child. Soto was turned over to the jail staff. Soto agreed to provide a breath specimen but during the test she failed to blow and stated she could not complete the test, test was stopped and considered a refusal.

• March 2, 2019 at approx. 5:30 p.m., Deputy Picazo was dispatched to FM 65 by the Popeye's Lake in regards to a moto vehicle accident. Dispatch stated that the vehicle was a silver Pontiac G6 belonging to Maribel Aguirre. The vehicle could not be located at the scene of the accident. Deputy Picazo found the vehicle at the Hernandez residence on FM65/River Spur Rd. The female subject, Maribel H. Aguirre stated that nothing happened. The male subject, Bernardo Reynolds stated he was driving when he got a blowout causing the vehicle to veer left striking the guard rail. It was discovered that the vehicle had no liability insurance. Reynolds received citations and the vehicle was impounded.

• March 19, 2019 at approx. 5:24 P.M., Deputy Lopez attempted

to conduct a traffic stop on a maroon Ford Expedition for passing vehicles on the shoulder lane on US Highway 83 north of Crystal City. After a pursuit, occupants of the vehicle bailed out on US Highway 83 and Old Uvalde Highway. Several subjects exited the vehicle and ran west bound through an open field. Vehicle was out of Dale, Texas. Two subjects were located on FM 4002 and released to Border Patrol agents who were assisting. Garcia's wrecker service took possession of the vehicle.

Hospital due to two male subjects from Batesville being treated for gunshot wounds. Upon arriving at the hospital, Deputy Martinez was briefed on the situation by Uvalde Police Officers. The victims were interviewed and it was stated that one of them was attempting to take a pistol apart. At some point the trigger was pulled causing one bullet to discharge. The bullet struck one victim in the hand and the other victim in the thigh. Both victims were taken to Uvalde Memorial Hospital by a witness that was there with them. The witness was interviewed and validated the victim's statements.

THIS WAS THE NEWS

From the Files of the Zavala County Sentinel

JULY 12, 1946

Lt. Royce Coleman arrived home first of July and is at the home of his mother, Mrs. Virginia Coleman. Lt. Coleman went into service four years ago and was in the Air Corps. He spent fifteen months in Germany.

Darrell Ray arrived Wednesday after getting his discharge at Fort Sam Houston from the Intelligence Department of the Army. Mrs. Ray, accompanied by Mrs. I. C. Cribbs, Mrs. W. H. Smith, and Albert Little Ray went to San Antonio and brought Mr. Ray to Crystal City.

Attorney and Mrs. R. A Taylor Jr. have purchased the J. O. Hidy residence at 1021 N. Fifth Avenue.

Miss Grace Barnes of Crystal City and Mrs. Beth Gault of Langtry have written a book entitled "So This is Langtry." The history of Langtry and Judge Roy Bean is given much detail in the 32-page book and makes interesting reading.

The Cross S Hotel has had a thorough going over. The building has been repainted outside and all woodwork inside repainted. The floors have new coverings and the entire place looks new.

Mr. and Mrs. Lex Harp and family moved Wednesday to the house on E. Uvalde St they bought from Mrs. Bessie Presley. The place was vacated by Mr. and Mrs. Joe Laird who moved to the John Laird farm where they will be located temporarily.

The Bagwell family reunion was held at the Abilene State Park near Abilene on July 7 with about 120 present. Members of the Hale family of Crystal City were among those attending.

Work has started on the bypass highway. The new highway will leave the present highway north of town at the corner of the Pulliam farm and follow the old Uvalde highway south to about the Bob Guylar farm just north of the Internment Camp, then west to cross the railroad just south of the Swindall School and across the northwestern corner of Crystal City, then across the bayouque.

JULY 28, 1933

Through the RFC there are at this time 18 men at work digging holes for tree planting along the highway, 35 men at work in Precinct 1, 18 in Precinct 2, 18 in Precinct 3, 40 in Precinct 4, 22 men at work in the City of Crystal City, 9 at high school building sidewalks and working on ball grounds, and one man at grammar school repairing and re-varnishing desks. Howard Williamson, county RFC chairman, says he will furnish all labor for the building of sidewalks and property owners would have to furnish only the material. He is going to try to get the city to furnish the sand and gravel, and if this can be done, the property owner would only furnish cement.

A rainfall of 2 1/4 inches fell over part of the Crystal City section last Monday, breaking a long drought. It was worth thousands of dollars to this section, especially to the stockmen, as water was getting low in tanks and reservoirs.

Miss Grace Barnes, who attended the first session of summer school at Alpine, left there for Langtry at which place she will visit her brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. Guy Skiles, for several days.

President Williams of the Federal Farm Loan Bank of Houston is here looking over the country with a view to loans covering irrigated farm lands. Heretofore it has not been possible to borrow any more on well improved irrigated farms than on an ordinary dry land farm.

The Roosevelt legislation which was passed by the last Congress and is now in operation has completely changed the primary functions of the government. Up to the present administration the government did not interfere much in matters of economics. Anti-trust and labor laws, tariffs, farm bills and RFC were the only important exceptions to the time-honored and revered policy of "hands off business."

JULY 12, 1963

The possibility that Crystal City will have parking meters in the downtown areas now exists. City Manager George Ozuna asked for and received permission to investigate the possibility of placing parking meters in the downtown area at Tuesday night's meeting of city council.

A delegation from the Crystal City Mexican Chamber of Commerce attended installation ceremonies of the Laredo Mexican chamber last week. They were Mr. and Mrs. Frank Guajardo, Mr. and Mrs. Luz Arcos, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Mata, Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Rice, and Mr. and Mrs. Ruben Lopez.

The engagement of Miss Bertha Benavides to Mr. Robert R. Gamez has been announced by her father, Mr. Albano Benavides.

At Batesville, the members of the Woodlawn Cemetery Association met and agreed to buy a new power mower for the cemetery. Plans were also made for a Mexican supper to be held as a fund-raiser for upkeep of the cemetery.

Armandina Galvan left by train on Monday of last week for Bakersfield, California. She is visiting relatives there and in Hollywood and Salinas.

JULY 2, 1973

Dr. Paul S. Sturm started his dental practice in Uvalde this week in the office of Dr. C. A. Hess. He is a 1966 graduate of Crystal City High School, and received his DDS degree from the University of Texas Dental Branch in Houston.

The Zavala County Health Association of Crystal City will conduct groundbreaking ceremonies for the clinic building to house El Centro de Salud at Jackson Plaza on Sunday. The out-patient clinic will be built by local contractors. Antonio Rios is president of the board of directors. Other directors are Catalina Maldonado, Viviana Santiago, Ernesto Olguin, Rita Yanas, Elena Diaz, Cornelio Flores, Marta Cotera, Margarita Gonzalez, Amador Guerrero, and Pedro Falcon, all of Crystal City, and Eusebio Munoz, Uvalde, Esteban Najera, Arnulfo Melendrez and Antonio Perez, all of La Pryor. Luz Gutierrez is director of center, while Arturo Gonzalez is assistant.

PARA OBTENER UN DECRETO DE FINANCIAMIENTO

El 8 de marzo de 2019, AEP Texas Inc. (AEP Texas) presentó ante la Comisión de Servicios Públicos de Texas ("Comisión") la solicitud para un decreto de financiamiento con el objetivo de aseguración de los costos por restauración del sistema (la "solicitud") conforme a lo permitido por el Subcapítulo I del Capítulo 36 y el Subcapítulo G del Capítulo 39 de la Ley de Regulación de Servicios Públicos ("PURA", por sus siglas en inglés). El decreto de financiamiento:

- autorizará la emisión de bonos para restauración del sistema por una cantidad que al momento se estima en aproximadamente \$229 millones;
- aprobará la estructura de financiamiento de la aseguración propuesta por AEP Texas;
- aprobará los suficientes cargos por restauración del sistema para recuperar el capital e intereses de los bonos para restauración del sistema y para recuperar los costos corrientes permitidos; y
- aprobará las revisiones a la tarifa de AEP Texas para implementar los cargos por restauración del sistema dentro de su territorio de servicio certificado en la División Central, así como la cláusula adicional de un crédito por separado para devolver a los clientes los beneficios de los diferidos impuestos federales sobre la renta que se hayan acumulado y estén relacionados con la aseguración.

Si la solicitud de AEP Texas es aprobada, afectará a: (1) proveedores minoristas de electricidad ("REP", por sus siglas en inglés) que atiendan a consumidores minoristas de uso final de electricidad, ubicados en el área de servicio certificada en la División Central de AEP Texas, tal como existan a la fecha en que sea aprobado por parte de la Comisión, el decreto de financiamiento propuesto; (2) servicios públicos de electricidad y cooperativas eléctricas de propiedad municipal con múltiples áreas de servicio certificadas en la División Central de AEP Texas, que atiendan a consumidores minoristas de uso final de electricidad, que solicitaron cambiarse con ellos habiendo estado con AEP Texas, después de la fecha en que la Comisión haya aprobado el decreto de financiamiento propuesto; (3) consumidores minoristas de uso final ubicados en el área de servicio certificada en la División Central de AEP Texas atendidos a través de las entidades descritas en (1) y (2), tal como existan a la fecha en que sea aprobado por parte de la Comisión, el decreto de financiamiento propuesto; y (4) consumidores minoristas de uso final de electricidad ubicados en el área de servicio certificada en la División Central de AEP Texas, quienes han instalado la "nueva generación en el lugar" según se define en PURA § 39.252 (b), tal como existan a la fecha en que sea aprobado por parte de la Comisión, el decreto de financiamiento propuesto.

De conformidad con el Capítulo 36, Subcapítulo I de PURA, AEP Texas tiene autorización para recuperar los costos permitidos correspondientes a la restauración del servicio público después del Huracán Harvey y otros eventos que califiquen y estén relacionados al clima, a través de cargos no pasables por restauración del sistema que respalden el reembolso de los bonos para restauración del sistema. La cantidad estimada de aproximadamente \$229 millones que AEP Texas busca asegurar, está conformada con los costos por restauración del sistema que, por medio del Expediente No. 48577, la Comisión autorizó que sean recuperados, junto con otros costos permitidos que se establecerán al ser aprobado, por parte de la Comisión, el decreto de financiamiento propuesto.

AEP Texas propone recuperar los cargos por restauración del sistema a través de los REP y otras entidades que deben facturar, pagar o cobrar los cargos por restauración del sistema conforme a los términos del decreto de financiamiento o las tarifas aprobadas por el mismo, y por medio de ellos, de los consumidores minoristas de electricidad de uso final. FOR A FINANCING ORDER

On March 8, 2019, AEP Texas Inc. (AEP Texas) filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("Commission") an application for a financing order to securitize system restoration costs (the "application") as allowed by Subchapter I of Chapter 36 and Subchapter G of Chapter 39 of the Public Utility Regulatory Act ("PURA"). The financing order will:

- authorize the issuance of system restoration bonds in an amount currently estimated to be approximately \$229 million;
- approve the securitization financing structure proposed by AEP Texas;
- approve system restoration charges sufficient to recover the principal of and interest on the system restoration bonds and to recover ongoing qualified costs; and
- approve its revisions to AEP Texas' tariff to implement the system restoration charges within its certificated Central Division service territory, as well as a separate credit rider to return to customers accumulated deferred federal income tax benefits associated with securitization.

AEP Texas' application, if approved, will affect: (1) retail electric providers ("REPs") serving retail end-use consumers of electricity located in AEP Texas' certificated Central Division service area as it exists on the date of the Commission approval of the proposed financing order; (2) municipally owned electric utilities and electric cooperatives with multiply certificated service areas with AEP Texas Central Division serving retail end-use consumers of electricity who requested to switch to them from AEP Texas following the date of the Commission approval of the proposed financing order; (3) retail end-use customers located in AEP Texas' certificated Central Division service area as it existed on the date of the Commission approval of the proposed financing order, served through the entities described in (1) and (2); and (4) retail end-use consumers of electricity located in AEP Texas' certificated Central Division service area as it existed on the date of the Commission approval of the proposed financing order, who have installed "new on-site generation" as defined in PURA § 39.252(b).

Pursuant to Chapter 36, Subchapter I of PURA, AEP Texas is authorized to recover qualified costs related to the restoration of utility service following Hurricane Harvey and other eligible weather-related events, through nonbypassable system restoration charges which support repayment of system restoration bonds. The estimated amount of approximately \$229 million which AEP Texas seeks to securitize is composed of the system restoration costs the Commission authorized for recovery in Docket No. 48577, along with other qualified costs to be established by the Commission approval of the proposed financing order.

AEP Texas proposes to recover the system restoration charges from REPs and other entities which are required to bill, pay or collect system restoration charges under the terms of the financing order or the tariffs approved thereunder, and through them from retail end-use consumers of electricity. AEP Texas proposes that the system restoration charges for the customer classes be calculated based upon the allocation to such classes of the qualified costs using the methodology and billing determinants described in its application. AEP Texas proposes that periodic adjustments be made to the system restoration charges to correct for prior over- or under-collections and to ensure the expected recovery of amounts sufficient to timely provide for all payments of debt service and other required amounts and charges in connection with the system restoration bonds. AEP Texas further proposes that REPs be required to meet certain credit and collection standards that are set forth in the tariff for which AEP Texas seeks approval.


