Hudak. "Unfortunately, this child's story is not unique."

USDA seeks public comments on conservation practice standards

USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) announced today it is seeking public input on its existing national conservation practice standards as part of implementing the 2018 Farm Bill. NRCS offers 150-plus conservation practices to America's farmers, ranchers and forest landowners to help them meet their business and natural resource needs on their working lands. "With the help of NRCS, agricultural producers across the country are taking voluntary steps to improve their operations while benefiting natural resources," NRCS Chief Matthew Lohr said. "As part of our process of implementing the 2018 Farm Bill, we are asking agricultural producers, conservation partners and others to provide feedback on our practice standards in an effort to refine

and enhance them." NRCS is requesting public comments on how to improve conservation practice standards that support programs such as the Environmental Quality Incentives Program and Conservation Stewardship Program, which help producers cover part of the costs for implementing these practices. The comment period ends April 25, 2019. More information can be found in the Federal Register offsite link image. These standards provide guidelines for planning, designing, installing, operating and maintaining conservation practices. **2018 Farm Bill.** As part of implementing the 2018 Farm Bill, NRCS is reviewing conservation practices by:

- Evaluating opportunities to increase flexibility while ensuring natural resource

benefits.

- Seeking avenues for the optimal balance between meeting site-specific conservation needs and minimizing risks of design failure and associated construction and installation costs.
- Ensuring, to the maximum extent practicable, the completeness and relevance of the standards to local agricultural, forestry and natural resource needs, including specialty crops, native and managed pollinators, bioenergy crop production, forestry and others.

Zavala County Futures Forum Set for Next Week

If you received an invitation letter for this event and if you did not but want to attend and provide your input you are more than welcome to attend. The event will take place next Tuesday March 19, 2019 at 6:30 p.m. at the La Pryor School Cafeteria. This process is being held in every county in Texas from January 1 to May 31, 2019. The 2019 Texas Community Futures Forum marks the 20 anniversary of this process. The original TCFF was held in 1999 with great success.

Our ability to meet educational needs depends on knowing what local residents see as their issues that impact their lives. There is no way to know the answers to these questions unless they are asked. Therefore, Extension will involve local people in a process to ask residents what is important to them. This activity is just one part of the process to identify issues. The issues that surface will be discussed with county committees, task forces, and subject matter specialists to determine the appropriate action for educational program-

ming. Moreover, they will be shared with other agencies and educational groups to see if a program partnership can be formed to address the issue, as A&M AgriLife Extension is unique because it has Extension agents in every county of the state. This uniqueness provides an opportunity to bring together the people of Texas, other service agencies, and educational groups to help provide solutions to the problems and issues facing Texans. Remember the mission of Extension: "Improving the lives of people, businesses, and communities across Texas and beyond through high-quality, relevant education."

Wild Pig Survey Available for Your Input

Tip of The Week: Heirloom Gardening is on the Rise How You Can Participate

I guess the starting point for the purposes of this ar-

ticle is what is Heirloom or heirloom gardening. In popular usage, a heirloom is something that has been passed down for generations through family members. Examples are antiques, family habits, jewelry and in this case vegetable seeds. So what's a real heirloom variety? A real heirloom vegetable or fruit variety has a history, a history which means something to someone.

The relationship behind it is important. The memories attached are important. These things give one a sense of place and time when growing such varieties. Regardless of the heirloom seeds you purchase it would be interesting for you to do a little research and find the history behind the heirloom variety you will attempt to grow in your garden this year.

While some people try to define "heirloom" by age, such as saying that any plant that originated before 1951 (after which hybridization became popular) is an heirloom, the most widely accepted definition of what constitutes an heirloom is that it is open-pollinated and was grown in an

earlier era. Some heirlooms are hundreds of years old, and others originated around the turn of the 20th century. Why Grow Heirlooms?

Heirloom plants have a large following among home gardeners and organic gardeners in particular. Some of the most common reasons for growing heirlooms are:

1. Wider Variety: When you have access to plants that were grown by previous generations, you also get to experience the thrill of having a huge variety of plants available to you. For example, the Seed Savers Exchange, which deals solely in heirlooms, has 77 varieties of tomatoes in this year's catalog. Unless you have acreage, it would take years just to try them all. And among those 77 varieties are every color, size, and flavor of tomato imaginable.

2. Better Flavor: In many cases, hybridizers have chosen properties like disease resistance and heavy yields over flavor. Fans of heirlooms will argue that many of the best-tasting crops come from heirloom plants.

3. Biogenetic Diversity: Plant species are dying out

at an alarming weight. Heirloom gardeners, through growing and saving seeds of treasured crops, are ensuring that these plants won't become extinct. In addition, keeping diversity in our food chain protects us against large plagues or crop failures.

4. Frugality: Growing heirlooms is a frugal way to have a bountiful garden. Each season, you can grow the crop, harvest the food, save the seeds, and store them to grow next year's garden. If you save a lot of seed, you can even get involved in seed exchanges with other heirloom gardeners to get more diversity in your garden. If you do not have a source for heirloom seeds here is an excellent site which features over 250 heirloom seed suppliers for your heirloom seeds. Simply go to <http://www.off-grid.info/food-independence/heirloom-seed-suppliers.html>. Growing heirlooms is a fun, educational experience that every organic gardener can try. Just don't be surprised if you become hooked on heirlooms!

The truck was released to Garcia's Wrecker Service.



Traffic fatalities, injuries edge higher in energy-producing areas of Texas

TxDOT launches "Be Safe. Drive Smart." campaign, reminding motorists to use caution when traveling through state's energy regions

AUSTIN — Booming energy production has brought jobs and economic gains to communities throughout Texas, but also an unintended consequence with a rise in traffic fatalities and injuries. In 2017, more than 194,000 crashes — an average of 532 per day in the state's five main oil and gas production regions — resulted in 1,614 deaths and 7,422 serious injuries, a slight increase over the previous year.

TxDOT officials point to failure to control speed and driver inattention as the main reasons we are seeing a rise in traffic crashes in areas such as the Barnett Shale, Eagle Ford Shale, Granite Wash, Haynesville/Bossier Shale and Permian Basin. Driving under the influence of alcohol is also a primary factor in these fatal crashes.

"Increased traffic and larger, heavier vehicles are changing driving conditions in many parts of Texas," said Texas Transportation Commissioner Alvin New. "We're working with state, federal, local and industry partners to address safety and congestion, and we're also reminding motorists to be safe and drive smart by following all traffic laws, giving their full attention to the road, and being cautious around the many water, sand and heavy equipment trucks traveling through energy-producing areas."

Motorists can expect to see a variety of reminders in the coming weeks as TxDOT kicks off its annual "Be Safe. Drive Smart." safety campaign that urges drivers to take precautions when sharing the road with heavy trucks and work crews in energy-producing regions that cover more than half of the state's 254 counties. The campaign's TV and radio spots, billboards, gas pump messages and digital advertising encourage drivers to follow basic common sense safety tips:

- Always buckle up - drivers and all passengers, day and night.

- Drive a safe speed that takes traffic, road conditions and weather into account.
- Focus 100 percent on driving and put the phone away.
- Give large trucks plenty of space. Be careful and only pass vehicles when it is safe to do so.
- Obey all stop signs and traffic signals.
- Never drive under the influence of alcohol or other drugs.

TxDOT will host community events this month in the Permian Basin and Eagle Ford Shale featuring a new interactive public engagement exhibit outfitted with a variety of games and video displays that educate visitors about the importance of safe and smart driving in high-traffic oil and gas production areas.

In addition to raising public awareness about crash prevention steps, TxDOT also is committed to repairing and improving roads in the state's energy-production areas. The Texas Transportation Commission has directed \$3.4 billion to make repairs and improve roads in the booming Permian Basin over the next decade. While only 2 percent of Texans live in the Permian Basin region, 11 percent of all traffic fatalities in the state took place there in 2017.

"Be Safe. Drive Smart." is a key component of #EndTheStreakTX, a larger grassroots effort that empowers drivers to make safer choices while on the road. Since Nov. 7, 2000, at least one person has died on Texas roadways every single day and that's why #EndTheStreakTX asks all Texans to commit to helping end the streak of daily deaths on our roadways. TxDOT utilizes other driver education initiatives such as "Be Safe. Drive Smart." to help in this endeavor.





From the Files of the Zavala County Sentinel

JULY 7, 1933

Austin Hancock asked us to ask the public to please not drive in front of the fire truck in going to a fire, to try and observe the rules and law. Many of the calls lately have been from the country and if a car runs in front of the fire truck it makes a dust and slows the truck because it has no windshield and the dust blinds the driver.

The Rotary Club's new president, Sol C. Freed, and new secretary, Noel P. Wilkinson, took charge last Monday. A congratulatory message was ordered sent to Arthur Mayhew on his being elected as a director of Rotary International.

With only a small shower of .11 inch recorded for the month of June at the Winter garden Experiment Station, the rainfall for the year so far is 2.67 inches below normal June was 1.90 inches below normal. The temperatures averaged 83.4 degrees.

Tuesday was the glorious Forth and our little city was almost deserted for most everyone went either to the rodeo at Cotulla, the Golden Jubilee at Del Rio, the bull fight at Pierdas Negras, or on the river nearby just for an outing.

Wilkinson, motored to the La Pryor-Uvalde crossing Tuesday where they celebrated the Fourth with a picnic dinner and swimming.

Tax collector H.P. Walker reports collections for June at \$20,422.65. Of this amount, \$14,049.50 goes to the county and the rest to the state. This puts the county finances in pretty good shape.

JUNE 21, 1946

Due to the increased ice demands for fruit and vegetables, Central Power and Light Co. will be unable to furnish the public cooling for watermelons as every foot of space is needed for ice storage.

The Woman's Chamber of Commerce has made arrangements to have a barbecue pit and tables built on the lawn at the Community Building. The members voted to have a woman's ball game for benefit of this construction.

The first meeting of the Crystal City Civic Club was held Monday. Officers elected were Mrs. H.H. Herrington, president; Mrs. J.D. Pointer, vice president; Mrs. Elizabeth Millan, secretary; and Abie Guevara, reporter. Mrs. Herrington emphasized that anyone who is interested in the welfare of Crystal City and Zavala County is invited to attend the meetings.

Congressman Milton H. West of Brownsville has formally announced his candidacy for re-election to the House of Representative in Washington from the 15 Congressional District.

The Woman's Auxillary of the Presbyterian Church met at the home of Mrs. G. W. Reed. Mrs. Nash gave the lesson. Refreshments were served to 15 members and two guests.

JUNE 21, 1963

Crystal City's four-man police force dropped to a two-man force Friday with the registration of Deputy Marshal O.L. Grelle following suspension of Leonardo Santoya.

A "push broom parade" to start Crystal City's clean-up campaign will begin at the Old Methodist Church building. Wielding push broom, the paraders will sweep the city's two main streets as a start in cleaning up the town.

A fire of undetermined origin completely gutted the Cross Y Café north of Crystal City. Flames completely burned out the interior of the building. Damage estimates ranged from \$100,000 to \$500,000.

On Saturday, June 15, at the First Baptist Church in Crystal City, Miss Brenda Kay Ray became the bride of Charles Waymon Langley

On Friday evening, June 14, Mrs. Robert Cathart honored her daughter Cindy with a birthday party.

JUNE 21, 1973

Melissa Laird has been named a Distinguished Student for her academic achievement for the spring semester at Texas A&M University.

Voters in the Batesville school district turned down consolidation with the La Pryor school district. Batesville voters opposed consolidation by a vote of 157 to 67. La Pryor voted 296 for to 67 against. The statutes require that voters in both districts must approve of consolidation before it may be done.

The City of Crystal City is starting a water, sewer and paving project in Mexico Chico with its revenue sharing funds of \$46,035. The city is working at improving the city park on the west side of town on Highway 83. A sprinkler system has been installed, and also in the works are an enclosed kiddie park with play equipment, four structures with toilet facilities, 14 areas with barbecue and eating facilities, and a bicycle trail.

Three Crystal City High School students have been awarded full scholarships to college preparatory schools in Connecticut. Jose Luis Esquivel received a scholarship to Taft School in Danbury; Roberto Maldonado and Francisco Guerra Jr. to Wooster School in Watertown. IMAGE sponsored the applications and coordinated with the Wolverine Council of San Antonio and the "A Better Chance" organization of Boston.
