ZCAD notices have been mailed out

Chief Appraiser, Juan P. Tapia, would like to inform the taxpayers that the Zavala County Appraisal District has mailed out appraisal notices. Mr. Tapia wants to advise the taxpayers to please not ignore the appraisal notice, as it serves to inform the property owners of the appraisal district's appraised value of the taxpayer's property. Taxpayers will have 30 days from the date on the appraisal notice to file a protest with the appraisal district staff informally to try and resolve their protest. Informal meetings will not be held on the day of hearing. If no agreement is reached with the staff, then the taxpayer will have an opportunity to appear before an Appraisal Review Board (ARB). The ARB is a group of a local, Zavala County citizens that hear and determine property appeals and protests. There is a limit of 10% increase on the appraised value of a

property. However, this limit only applies to a residential homestead property. New property owners, disabled persons or age 65 and over property owners, can file a residential homestead exemption. It is the responsibility of the taxpayer to make sure the appraisal district ownership information is correct. They should verify that the mailing address on the accounts is correct, that the exemption (if applicable) is applied and if any errors are noted, to please call the office. Mr. Tapia is informing the property owners to make sure they receive ALL appraisal notices on all properties owned by the taxpayers, and if taxpayers need assistance and/or an explanation on the notices of appraised value, to please contact the office. The phone number is (830) 374-3475. The appraisal staff is available to assist taxpayers with their questions and concerns.

DRH celebrating its 70 Platinum year anniversary

1949 - 2019
 It is with great pride and honor to inform Dimmit County and its surrounding communities that Dimmit Regional Hospital, a 501(c) 3 Not-for-Profit organization is celebrating 70 wonderful years of providing care to our communities. Dimmit Regional Hospital first known as Dimmit County Memorial Hospital opened its doors in 1949 as a county hospital with 25 licensed beds under the direction of Hospital Superintendent, Mrs. Alice Vander Zee. DCMH offered acute short-term health care under the Hill Burton Act. Other services offered are outpatient services such as (labs, x-ray and respiratory). It first opened in September of 1949, where it operated continuously until it briefly closed on June, 1972.

re-opened under temporary administration of Mrs. Lucille Myers. It re-opened with the same previous ownership, Medical Staff, new Board of Managers and most of the previous employees. In 1975, Mr. Bernard Yanity became hospital administrator and proposed for a hospital expansion. The state licensed it for 49 beds. A year later on July 1976, an expansion and remodeling program was initiated. The completely rehabilitated patient area with a centralized nurse's station, modern patient rooms and equipment was opened in November 1976. The expansion made the hospital stand as a modern 49 bed facility with a new and modern laboratory unit, two x-ray rooms, two surgical suites, two delivery rooms and two emergency treatment rooms. In 1998, under Ernest Flores Jr., hospital administrator, the hospital went through another expansion

al City to receive immediate information regarding weather and other emergencies. With this new notification system, the residents of Zavala County will be able to receive accurate information as soon as it becomes available", said County Judge Joe Luna. Anyone can register free for this service at Zavala

County's website: co.zavala.tx.us just click on the Hyper-Reach Logo or Link. Create an account, enter your information. Information will be kept confidential and secure. Notifications can be translated in Spanish or any of the 166 other languages in seconds.

News from your County Agent

Greetings to all of you and I hope all of you had a wonderful mother's day weekend. If you were like me I had to set aside some time during this special weekend to catch up with my mowing duties, thanks to recent rains that have given our lawns the necessary moisture needed to take off and grow and grow fast I must add. Of course we need to look ahead to the summer when temperatures will no doubt rise and conditions will call for special care of your lawn when it comes to mowing (Please read this week's-Tip of the Week).

Zavala County Pecan Growers Reminded of Pecan Nut Casebearer (PBC) Surveillance

Anyone in the pecan business in Zavala should know the importance of monitoring and management of PNC. The impact of first generation PNC can range from beneficial with light infestations thinning an overloaded crop to 100 percent crop loss. As a commodity, we are fortunate in that we have an excellent monitoring tool with the PNC pheromone trap and excellent insecticides for management when needed. Data from PNC pheromone traps allow producers to anticipate events of egg lay (oviposition) and nut entry. From the time of first significant catch, which is the date of the first catch of two consecutive collection dates, egg lay begins in 7 to 10 days while nut entry will start 12 to 16 days after first significant catch. Tip of the Week: New Mowing Recommendations for Warm Season Turf Grasses

Recent rains have really helped our turf grasses in Zavala county to respond well to this moisture prompting many of us to get active with mowing activities. Of course we need to keep in mind that this kind of rapid grass growth will start to slow down as we go into the hotter and drier part of the year. Mowing is perhaps the most common cultural practice performed in turfgrass systems. When performed properly, mowing is used to maintain a particular turfgrass height and appearance that supports the specific use and aesthetic expectations of that area. It is important to remember that while turfgrasses have evolved to tolerate mowing, this practice is still a stress factor for your lawn. Such stresses may include temperature extremes, drought, nutrient deficiencies, shade, traffic, and pests. Mowing practices—including height of cut and mowing frequency—can impact turfgrass response to each of these stresses. Therefore, it is important to take steps to adopt appropriate mowing practices that support the overall health of the turf and simultaneously opti-

mize resource-use efficiency.

Several factors determine the appropriate height of cut for any designated turfgrass. When possible, it is generally recommended that turfgrasses be maintained at the higher height of cut for the given species and cultivar. Taller canopy growth generally corresponds to greater energy production which supports deeper and more vigorous rooting. Deeper root systems may result in improved water infiltration, nutrient and water-use efficiency, and improved overall turfgrass stress tolerance. Some species, a higher height of cut has also been found to reduce weed pressure, as taller grass is better able to out-compete encroaching weeds for resources such as light, water, and nutrients. Finally, a higher height of cut will require less frequent mowing based on the 1/3 Rule.

As a general rule of thumb, no more than 1/3 of the total turfgrass plant should be removed at any one time. For example, if your intended mowing height is 2", then you would need to mow before the plant has exceeded 3" in order not to 'scalp' the turf. Therefore, appropriate mowing frequency is determined by the rate of growth. Several factors including temperature, precipitation, light, and nutrient management will impact the rate of turfgrass growth throughout the year. Remember that supplemental nitrogen, though generally beneficial to turfgrass growth, will encourage faster growth that may not be appropriate for areas that will be mowed less frequently. Nitrogen applications should, therefore,

be partially determined by management capabilities.


During peak periods of growth for warm-season grasses (summer), more frequent mowing—sometimes two times per week—may be required to prevent turfgrass scalping. Scalping is the excessive removal of leafy green growth from turfgrass resulting in injury to the turfgrass. It is important to remember that plants require adequate green leaf tissue for photosynthesis and energy production. Excessive removal of leaf tissue through scalping can be detrimental to turfgrass health, as it limits the plant's ability to produce adequate energy to sustain growth. When turfgrass is mowed too infrequently, scalping is more likely to occur. When turfgrass has become unavoidably overgrown, consider gradually lowering the height of the turfgrass over time to prevent the removal of more than 1/3 total height in a single mowing. Turfgrasses that are maintained at a lower height of cut will require more frequent mowing to follow the 1/3 Rule.

It is important to properly maintain any equipment that is being used to manage a turfgrass area. Dull mower blades will not cut grass properly and may cause injury by crushing, shredding, or leaving jagged, uneven cuts on turfgrass leaf blades. These injuries will increase turfgrass susceptibility

to pests including diseases and insects and will ultimately compromise turfgrass response to other environmental stresses such as drought or heat. Most mower blades can be sharpened at home or professionally. Dirty or contaminated mower blades can also increase the likelihood of the spreading of some turf diseases and may physically disperse turfgrass pests including diseases, insects, and weeds.

When mowing multiple areas with different pest populations, take steps to adequately clean equipment to prevent contamination across sites. The use of a hose, scrub brush, and dish soap can be beneficial in cleaning mower blades. The objective should be to remove any grass clippings or outdoor debris from the blades and surrounding crevices on the mower deck.

When possible, take steps to ensure that the blades dry properly before the lawn mower is returned to storage. In some cases, it has been recommended to use a light coating of cooking spray or other light oil on mower blades to reduce accumulation of debris on the blades and facilitate easier cleaning. Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

Property owners have the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- the appraised (market) value of your property
- the unequal value of your property compared with other properties
- the inclusion of your property on the appraisal roll
- any exemptions that may apply to you
- the qualification for an agricultural or timber appraisal
- the taxing units taxing your property
- the property ownership
- the change of use of land receiving special appraisal
- failure of the chief appraiser or appraisal review board (ARB) to send a required notice
- any action taken by the chief appraiser, county appraisal district (CAD) or ARB that applies to and adversely affects you.

Informal Review

Review by the ARB
If you cannot resolve your problem informally with the CAD, you file a notice of protest requesting to have your case heard by the ARB.

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that hears and determines protests regarding property appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the CAD to make the necessary changes based on evidence heard during the ARB hearing.

If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing and send you written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. If necessary, you may request a hearing in the evening or on a Saturday or Sunday. You may use Comptroller Form 50-132, *Property Appraisal - Notice of Protest*, to file your written request for an ARB hearing.

Prior to your hearing, you may ask to review the evidence the CAD plans to introduce at the hearing to establish any matter at issue. Before a hearing on a protest or immediately after the hearing begins, you or your agent and the CAD are required to provide each other with a copy of any materials (evidence) intended to be offered or submitted to the ARB at the hearing. Evidence may be submitted for any hearing type either in paper or on a small portable electronic device (such as a CD, USB flash drive or thumb drive) which will be kept by the ARB. Do NOT bring evidence on a smart phone. The ARB's hearing procedures regarding all the requirements to properly submit evidence on a small portable electronic device must be reviewed.

To the greatest extent practicable, the hearing will be informal. You or a designated agent may appear in person or you may by telephone conference call or submission of written affidavit to present

your evidence, facts and argument. If you decide to participate by telephone conference call, you must provide your evidence to the ARB with a written affidavit before the ARB hearing begins. You may use Comptroller Form 50-283, *Property Owner's Affidavit of Evidence to the Appraisal Review Board*, to submit evidence for your telephone conference call hearing or for hearing by affidavit.

You and the CAD representative have the opportunity to present evidence about your case. You may cross-examine the CAD representative. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented by both parties. In most cases, the CAD has the burden of establishing the property's value by a preponderance of the evidence presented.

In certain protests, the chief appraiser has the burden of proving the property's value by clear and convincing evidence. You should review ARB hearing procedures to learn more about evidence and related matters.

You should not try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. ARB members are required to sign an affidavit saying that they have not talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court, an Arbitrator or SOAH
After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you are not satisfied with the ARB's decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. As an alternative to the district court, you may appeal through binding arbitration or the State Office of Administrative Hearings (SOAH) if you meet the qualifying criteria.

If you choose to go to district court, you must start the process by filing a petition with the district court within 60 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If you choose to appeal through binding arbitration, you must file a request for binding arbitration with the CAD not later than the 15th day after you receive notice of the ARB order. If you choose to appeal to the SOAH, you must file an appeal with the CAD not later than the 30th day after you receive notice of the ARB's order. Appeals to district court, binding arbitration or SOAH all require payment of certain fees or deposits.

Tax Payment
You must pay the amount of taxes due on the portion of the taxable value not in dispute, the amount of taxes due on the property under the order from which the appeal is taken or the amount of taxes due in the previous year.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

Usual Deadline
Not later than May 15 (or within 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed for good cause if you miss the usual deadline. The ARB decides whether you have good cause. Late protests are not allowed after the ARB approves the appraisal records for the year.

Special Deadlines
For change of use (the CAD informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the determination was delivered to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change did not result from a

protest you filed), the deadline is not later than the 30th day after the notice of the change was delivered to you.

(You may insert deadline for protests concerning omitted property if doing so would avoid taxpayer confusion.)

Deadline to file protest is: June 15, 2019

If you believe the CAD or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually Feb. 1) or no later than the 125th day after the date you claim you received a tax bill from one or more of the taxing units that tax your property. The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

*The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or legal, state or national holiday.

José Dodier Jr. re-elected to Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board

TEMPLE — José O. Dodier Jr. of Zapata, Texas, was re-elected on May 7, 2019 to serve a two-year term on the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board (TSSWCB). Dodier represents TSSWCB State District III, which consists of 50 counties and 46 Soil and Water Conservation Districts (SWCDs) in the Gulf Coast and South Texas Plains region of the state.

Prior to his service on the TSSWCB, Dodier served three years as President and Immediate Past President of the Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts (ATSWCD). Dodier is also Chairman of the Zapata

Soil and Water Conservation District and has been a member of the board for 28 years. Dodier, who has been a member of the TSSWCB since May of 2005, is a partner in the Don José Land & Cattle Company in Zapata County, which the Dodier family has been operating for 85 years. The ranching enterprise is a conservation-driven, cow-calf operation that produces commercial Charbray cattle. He is also a member of the class of 1971 from the University of North Texas.

Dodier is also a member on the Board of Directors of the South Texas Workforce Solutions. Workforce Solutions for South Texas is a local organization that implements a system of services to increase community economic development in Jim Hogg, Webb and Zapata Counties.

On the national level, Dodier is a former member of the Board of Directors of the National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD) where he served for eight years as well as serving on the

NACD Executive Board. Dodier and his wife Janeann, have a daughter, Danielle and grandchildren Sofia and Ace. TSSWCB works in conjunction with local SWCDs across Texas to encourage the wise and productive use of natural resources. Established by the Texas Legislature in 1939, the TSSWCB is governed by seven board members, all of which are actively involved in agriculture or silviculture. Five of the board members are voted in by a delegation of their local peers, and two board members are appointed by the Governor of Texas. TSSWCB is the lead agency for planning, implementing, and managing coordinated natural resource conservation programs for preventing and abating agricultural and silvicultural nonpoint sources of water pollution. TSSWCB also works to ensure that the State's network of over 2,000 flood control dams are protecting lives and property by providing operation, maintenance, and structural repair grants to local government sponsors.

and remodeling project to expand the crowded two-room emergency treatment area into a four room trauma station. The emergency department is certified as a Basic (Level IV) trauma facility.

In 2010, the hospital passed a bond election and became Dimmit Regional Hospital as well as the creation of Dimmit Regional Hospital District.

April 2012 marked another day of success for DRH. Construction of the remodeling of new laboratory department with a new central location for all lab activities and a newly renovated pharmacy department as well.

On February 2015, the Radiology and Fluoroscopy Room with state of the art equipment was renovated and completed.

On July 2016, under Jim Buckner, hospital administrator, an additional hospital Physical Therapy department was opened and situated in our neighboring community of Crystal City, TX with new and state of the art rehabilitation equipment.

In September 29, 2017, DRH Women's Imaging Center opened its doors with the Selenia Dimensions 3D Mammography System, state of the art equipment. In addition to the mammography machine, we also have a Bone Density

machine and the new sonogram room.

On October 2017, DRH was certified as a Critical Access Hospital, under hospital administrator, Ernest Flores Jr. The hospital decreased the number of licensed beds to 25, allowing for 15 inpatient beds and 10 Swing Beds. The Swing Bed program allows for people who have been recently discharged from another facility or will soon be discharged and still require skilled nursing services for example IV therapy or physical therapy to stay close to home, if the required criteria are met.

March 2018, the hospital was designated a (Level I) Neonatal Nursery. We are distinguished status on the newborn hearing testing. We also do the Critical Congenital heart disease testing on all newborns before discharge.

On October, 2018, Dimmit Regional Hospital partnered with Methodist Healthcare of San Antonio, under the leadership of hospital administrator, John Graves. With the partnering of Methodist, it allowed us access to an incredible range of medical services, specially trained physicians, trainings and education plus other available services from Methodist Healthcare.

November 2018, Dimmit Regional Hospital opened the

Speech Language Pathology services with highly qualified pathologist for our Inpatients and Outpatients needing that type of service.

Agents arrest two Sex offenders in Eagle Pass

EAGLE PASS, Texas – U.S. Border Patrol agents assigned to the Eagle Pass Station arrested two previously deported convicted sex offenders for illegally entering the United States over two days.

"Our agents remain vigilant and committed to safeguarding our communities," said Del Rio Sector Chief Patrol Agent Raul L. Ortiz. "Convicted criminal aliens often try to avoid detection by exploiting the current immigrant crisis at our borders to illegally enter our country, and in many cases will return to the communities where they perpetrated their crimes."

On May 7, Border Patrol agents from the Eagle Pass Station arrested a 35-year-old Honduran man for illegally entering the United States. Records checks performed during processing revealed he was convicted in Harrisonburg, Virginia in 2008 on four counts of sexual crimes against a child.

The man was sentenced to five years confinement and was deported from the United

States in April 2010. In an unrelated incident on May 8, agents arrested a 34-year-old Honduran man for illegally entering the United States. Records checks revealed he was convicted in Brookhaven, Georgia in 2016 for child molestation. The man was sentenced to 18 months confinement and was deported from the United States in 2018.

Both men face a charge of 8 USC § 1326 – re-entry after deportation, which carries a maximum sentence of up to 20 years in prison.

All individuals arrested by the U.S. Border Patrol undergo record checks using biometrics to ensure those with criminal history or gang affiliation are positively identified.

The Del Rio Border Patrol Sector is part of the Joint Task Force-West South Texas Corridor, which leverages federal, state, and local resources to combat transnational criminal organizations. To report suspicious activity call the Del Rio Sector's toll free number at 1-866-511-8727.


From the office of the... District Attorney Roberto Serna D.A.

West to represent SWTJC at College National Finals Rodeo in Wyoming

Uvalde, TX, May 9, 2019 – Southwest Texas Junior College will be represented at this year's College National Finals Rodeo in Casper, Wyoming by Mertzson native Tyler West.

West has advanced to compete for the national title in steer wrestling, where he racked up a total of 637 points, which helped him finish in fourth place overall in the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association (NIRA) Southern region.

"It's a tremendous accomplishment and an honor to make it to the college national finals," said Joey Almand, SWTJC Rodeo Coach. "Most of our members are straight out of high school, and they are competing against athletes from universities or state colleges which have been out of high school for four and in some cases five years. Rodeo contestants will compete for jackpot go-round money and scholarship dollars at the College National Rodeo Finals. These will be awarded to the top performers in each event.

From the Files of the Zavala County Sentinel

SEPTEMBER 22, 1933

E. B. Taylor, proprietor of the Cross S. Hotel, has expanded several hundred dollars during the last week for new furniture, rugs and drapes for the bedrooms of the hotel. Each room has been equipped with a complete bedroom suite, comfortable chairs, writing desk and axminister rug. With Simmons bedsteads, springs and Beauty Rest mattresses the guest should be able to relax and enjoy real comfort. Mr. Taylor hopes to repaper the walls and repaint the woodwork in each room at a very early date. The dining room is now being renovated and made over for the fall trade and more than likely will be opened to the public by the first of October.

James C. Statler, manager for the Hudson Trading Company, says if the farmers have vegetables or other field produce to sell and will report it to him he will help dispose of it to truckers without charge.

There is quite a little building repair and remodeling work on. Probably the biggest piece of such work is the repairing of the big ice vault by Central Power and Light Co., and other work in preparation for fall and winter activities. They will start filling the 9,000 ton ice vault next week. The Guild Theatre is doing some remodeling which will include a drinking fountain and restroom.

The Winter Garden Experiment Station now has growing seedbeds over 800 ornamental date palms, two years old, grown for the Winter Garden Chamber of Commerce for planting along the main highways.

SEPTEMBER 6, 1946

A.C. Mogford announces he has purchased the interest of his partner, R. M. Shearer, in the Portable Cattle Chute Co. of Crystal City, and that the name of the business will be changed to Portable Chute Manufacturing Co. Mr. Shearer will remain with the business as foreman of the production end.

SEPTEMBER 7, 1963

A three-am committee to discuss further the possibility of making some changes in the operation of Crystal City's municipal airport was named following a meeting held Wednesday between City Manager George Ozu-na, his administrative assistant, Dave Shapiro, and ten men who use the airport facilities. Elected to serve on the committee were Kermit Marchall, Larry Volz, and Billy Franks.

The Crystal City High School cheerleaders, Karen Carter, Mary Coronado, Debbie Rossington and Carole Brennan, attended the cheerleader camp on the Lamar Tech campus in Beaumont. The girls rated a second place on Monday, the first day, but then went on to win first each day that followed.

The procedures for an appeal to the Fourth Court Civil Appeals were stated Tuesday by attorneys for the City of Crystal City following District Judge Ross E. Doughty's issuance of a mandamus last Wednesday ordering the city council a charter revision election.

SEPTEMBER 6, 1973

The Health Planning Advisory Committee of the Middle Rio Grande Development Council deferred until a later date any action on the controversial medical clinic "El Centro de Salud" in Crystal City. Approval of the out-patient health center by the MRGDC is required under the provisions of Public Law 92-603. The only other center of this type in the state is located at El Paso. The design of El Centro de Salud is supposed to accommodate 4,500 patients in the first year of operation. A total of \$809,096 has been budgeted for the first year's operation, with \$650,346 coming from federal funds.






